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1. Background and Approach

Embedding Evaluation for System-Wide Learning in South London

The Vision

- All service improvements or changes funded or commissioned in South London particularly those with potential for largescale impact—should include a proportionate and well-integrated evaluation component.
- This ensures a **robust understanding** of the outcomes and impact (and if possible, value for money) of each intervention or change.

Current Reality

- Evaluation is not applied systematically across the health and care system.
- There is wide variation in how evaluation is understood—both in terms of its value and the methods used.
- As a result, evaluation is often:
 - Not planned for from the outset
 - Under-resourced and under-incentivised
 - Lacking in organisational support
- In a fragmented system, many people are unclear about where to find evaluation expertise or how to access support.
- The **South London Evaluation Clinic** was established to realise the vision of **embedding system-wide evaluation** as a cornerstone of a learning and sustainable health and care system.
- The inception and development of the clinic were supported by both South East London and South West London ICBs, reflecting a shared recognition of the need to strengthen evaluation capacity within their respective health systems.
- Through a delivery-focused approach—taking **small, practical steps** to strengthen **evaluation culture and capability**—it aimed to drive meaningful and lasting improvement through:
 - Building on existing partnership working
 - Utilise and co-ordinate current assets better
 - A basis to build evaluation understanding and expertise across health and care system

In doing so, the Clinic provided structured, proportionate evaluation advice to projects across the health and care system, where formal evaluation expertise is limited or unavailable.

How the Clinic Worked

The South London Evaluation Clinic was a 3-month "proof of concept" pilot to test a virtual single front door model for evaluation support in South London.

- It ran from February to May 2025 and was staffed with evaluators from the HIN, KHP and KIS.
- Each clinic was supported by two advisers from different organisations, offering a broader and more diverse range of perspectives on evaluation.
- This model also fostered collaboration and promote cross-organisational learning.

Clinic key features:




Two-stage delivery process delivered by experienced advisers from Health Innovation Network South London, King's Improvement Science, and KHP Women's and Children's 'Ask the Institute'



Tailored advice on evaluation, including logic models, outcome measurement and metrics, use of frameworks, as well as signposting to other resources



Designed to be time-limited and responsive, using current expertise and capacity in a coordinated manner



2. Clinic's Engagement

Who the Clinic Reached

A total of 21 Expressions of Interest were received, and 16 projects were supported through the South London Evaluation Clinic.

Of these:

- 12 projects originated from South East London (SEL)
- 4 projects came from South West London (SWL)

Additionally:

- 2 organisations (both from the VCSE sector) did not attend their scheduled sessions
- 1 project required only a single meeting and did not proceed to a follow-up

What Clinic Users Said

A short online feedback survey was sent to Clinic users after the second and final meeting in a follow-up email. 11 of 16 of Clinic users completed it.

Survey results (n = 11):

- All found it helpful including 5 very helpful and 4 extremely helpful
- All found the booking process clear
- All would recommend the Clinic to their colleagues
- 10 out of 12 felt more confident (8 somewhat and 2 much more) doing evaluation post-advice
- All felt the Clinic should become a permanent offer

What they really valued

- Clear, supportive advice
- Non-judgmental space for reflection
- Opportunity to test and validate ideas
- Follow-up notes and signposting
- Felt "reassured" and "on the right track"

Suggestions for improvement

- Longer sessions or more time between meetings
- Opportunity to share project context in advance
- More clarity on what the clinic can and cannot support
- Ongoing access to advice/templates/tools

What Changed As Result

Due to the limited scope and timelines of the advice clinic, measuring impact was not possible. However, there is some early evidence that the advice given resulted in project change and a more thorough evaluation approach was considered as a result.

Early signs of impact in supported projects

- Enabled adoption of consistent outcome measures across services (e.g. loneliness, wellbeing)
- Other projects revised logic models and evaluation questions
- Several teams reported that the South London Evaluation Advice Clinic shaped their evaluation design

Overall impacts

- Greater confidence and clarity in early-stage evaluation planning
- Increased awareness of proportionate evaluation methods
- Strengthened demand for accessible, tailored evaluation support

Limitations

- Impact tracking was light-touch and short-term
- Some projects did not share follow-up updates
- It is too early to say whether the advice given was followed as some projects were in the development phase

3. Next Steps

The Future of the Clinic

- We are still committed to supporting our system partners in meeting their evaluation needs.
- This work aligns with NHSE's updated 2025/26 ICB blueprint, which places greater emphasis on robust evaluation using clear metrics, stakeholder feedback, and data to improve decision-making and accountability.
- The South London Evaluation Advice Clinic will restart in October 2025.

Short-term (now – Sept):

- Finalise and share key learning outputs
- Co-design a refined clinic model. As part of this, we plan to actively to engage with Patient and Public Involvement (PPI) experts.

Medium-term (Oct 2025-March 2026):

- Restart Clinic
- Monitor uptake, impact and clinic user experience
- Link to existing ICS-level initiatives

Longer-term

- Explore integrating the Clinic into a wider evaluation support offer (e.g. Ask ARC)
- Define resource requirements, a sustainable delivery model and funding
